Brothers and Sister in Christ,

I have recently heard on the news that a 3,400-year-old city emerges from a reservoir in Iraq after months of extreme drought. Archaeologists discovered a well-preserved wall made from sun-dried mud bricks. They also found ancient relics such as five ceramic vessels and 100 cuneiform tablets. They have a clearer picture of what the ancient city might have been like.

From this evacuation, I have learned one important lesson: it is hard to see what is in there unless we see the river bed. We cannot breathe in water for over five minutes. It is hard to see in the water since we have lousy visibility. Our mobility is not free. The deeper the water is, the harder it would be.

Many churches are experiencing a severe drought of ministry after the pandemic. Perhaps, we didn't see the direction of the church when the water was enough. Many are experiencing a drought of energy. Many are experiencing a drought of routine in church life. Many are experiencing a drought of worship attendance. We have been doing something in ministry to overcome a drought of vitality. Unfortunately, we are still thirsty without enough water.

Again, the good news is that when waters recede and become shallower, we can analyze our situations quickly and find what we need preciously. As the river bed is exposed, we can realize the seriousness and see what we need. God gives us water, but we can better prepare with strategies in the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

A church planter, Paul Nixon, came to our church on June 18, and I attended a replanting seminar in Topeka on June 20-21. While our congregation and I were talking about our church situations, I realized what we need for the church's ministry. I could assume that previous or existing terms might not work at some points. I could feel we have been missing something important in our ministry. The Messenger

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We have to consider two essential things discipleship and community. First, we have been missing the importance of discipleship. Jesus is our master teacher, and we follow his teachings. We need to teach our neighbors and friends his teachings. Without discipleship, we cannot sustain our church ministry. That's why we still learn who Jesus is even 2000 years later. I am preparing a discipleship program for next year. I will let you know more about this later.

Second, we need to reach out to the community. Without community, it is impossible to tell the growth of the church. We need to find ways to connect to the community. We need to show Jesus' love to our neighbors. We must discover how we support schools, nursing homes, and local businesses. We gave school supplies to our kids when school season started. This year we try it in a different way. I will announce that in our bulletin and newsletter.

The Holy Spirit is telling us don't make an excuse anymore. Don't do this tomorrow but do this NOW! The drought of church ministry is a sign to give us an opportunity. Without your act and decision, it is impossible because the church works only when people gather in the name of Christ. May God's blessings be upon us as we decide today.



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


If your child would like to go to church camp this summer we have money available to pay for her/him to attend. Camp information is on the bulletin board inside the west door.
